## **Corrigenda Unexpected Agenda**

(status: 11th December, 2024)

Following the publication of *Unexpected Agenda* (October 2024), I received feedback from Denis Behr, who has entered the complete content into his archives (to see the entries click here). Below are the corrections and comments:

- Page 55: "Business Card Handout II": a similar effect by Gary Kurtz is described in *Principles in Practice*, "The Bold Load", page 33. (I recently came across this basic effect in an older version of Martin Lewis's *Larry Jennings's Card-in-Envelope Wallet*, Jeff Busby, page 8.)
- Page 99: "Dribble Force with Gambler's Cop": I have already described the basic idea of this in *Hidden Agenda* (Cop Force, page 284).
- Page 130: "Key Card Locator" (Juan Tamariz): This strategy was already used by Ed Marlo in *New Tops*, see M.I.N.T. Volume 2, page 111.
- Page 164: Finale for "Twisting the Aces": This idea actually does not belong to Pete McCabe, but to Darwin Ortiz. He describes it in *Strong Magic* (page 63) and also in *Designing Miracles* (page 90).
- Page 224: "Aces and Jumbo Coin Production": I mention that it most likely has not been published by Patrick Page, but it is actually included in the comprehensive *Magic Page by Page*, page 64.
- Page 260: "Doubling Money": There are several references for this, such as *The Jinx* "Double Dollar", page 711, or another variation, "Double Your Money" in Fulves's *Self-Working Paper Magic*, page 23. Asi Wind uses the same fold described in the Agenda in his well-known effect "Time is Money" (frequently published, for instance in MAGIC, Feb. 2005).
- Page 267: "Out of This World": The method where the entire deck is red, and half is switched at the end, has been published several times, possibly first by Steven Kuske in *Pabular*, page 526.
- Page 309: "A Green Bet": I mention that Lennart Green hopefully will publish his Gilbreath trick. It has indeed been published as "The \$26,000 Bet" in *The Green Northern Lights Magic* (32).
- Page 319: "Double Mishap Opening": Although for the rope from cigarette pack idea I mention the *Tarbell Course*, I did not know the exact source. It is actually Milbourne Christopher's idea, which appeared in volume 2 of the *Tarbell Course* (p. 349).
